HAWS Positions: Looking for more involvement with H.A.? Then service with the HAWS board may be right for YOU! Our nominations committee is continuing to screen applications, interview, and recommend candidates to join the board. - Vice-Treasurer: This position serves to support the Treasurer in all HAWS financial matters including budgeting, tax filing, supervising bank accounts, and assessing the financial status of this fellowship.
- Non-Addict Advisor: This is someone who <u>is not</u> a member of H.A. They may be an expert in recovery fellowships, non-profits, or possess various business skills that they wish to volunteer for the good of H.A.
- Heroin Addict Advisor: This is someone who <u>is</u> a member of H.A. This person will utilize their experience with H.A. and 12-Step service to advise the board.
- Public Information Chair: This position is for a member of H.A. who will work with public information at the world level. The efforts of Public Information can be best summarized as taking actions to increase the general population's awareness and accessibility of Heroin Anonymous.
- Chips, Literature, and Merchandise Chair: This position is for a member of H.A. who will work with our paid employee to monitor chip sales, literature sales and startup kits. This member will also oversee the merchandise committee to create and distribute HAWS merchandise.
- At-large Voting Member: This position is for new members to the board; its sole function is to show up and help us to discuss and vote on decisions. Eventually, these members join other committees and may be asked to fill other roles. For example, for one of these spots, we are looking for someone with experience in intellectual property or literature writing.

ONE MORE ADDICT

Personal Story: Devon M.

I'm an A.A. baby; my parents married in A.A., had three kids, promptly divorced. then earliest memories are the love of my mishmash family, coupled with devastating loss after my parents both got re-divorced. I confused yet capable, attention-starved yet lovable little girl, always hopelessly yearning for validation outside of myself.

My first time smoking weed quickly turned into daily use. My first drink was alone on a random Wednesday, just to see what it felt like. I thrived as the party girl; I could be as loud and funny as I wanted. Alcohol and marijuana progressed to cocaine and party drugs. My family could tell I was alcoholic before I ever took a legal drink, but I laughed them off. It wasn't until I snorted first percocet that wondered if they were right. Within a month, I was physically addicted. Within six months, I selling and robbing sustain that addiction. Within one year, I switched from pills to heroin. I didn't know what was in that blue stamp; frankly, didn't care. Ι was shackled to the bag and the block.

I somehow managed to graduate from college and get a big girl job. I "successfully" lived the double life until the fear of dvina an addict's death Kensington, Philadelphia finally outweighed the fear of dope sick. So, when opportunity presented itself, I ran. I didn't say goodbye to my family or call out of work. I just ran. I detoxed cold turkey on a cross-country drive from Philadelphia to Phoenix. palm trees and sunshine brought me a fresh start. The heroin was removed, but nothing took its place. The cycle restarted. Trying to unpack trauma while continuing to drink daily didn't Alcohol and marijuana progressed to cocaine and party drugs, but I promised myself I would never do heroin again.

One Saturday night in October, I was preparing for the festivities of the night. What I didn't realize was that this night was to be the catalyst for me to reach a true spiritual bottom, and shortly thereafter, recovery. I got a call and was asked to go check on my aunt at her house. When I got there, she had passed away... and there was nothing I could do. Death was so real and so close. I began to knowingly drink for oblivion. I

didn't want to die, but I definitely didn't want to live. I knew it was only a matter of time until I broke the promise I made myself; I was going to do heroin again. So, before I gave myself the opportunity, I told on myself. "I'm a heroin addict. I'm terrified of myself."

I went to a meeting and found a sponsor quickly. With quidance, I found myself in the book of Alcoholics Anonymous. It was easy for me to admit I was powerless over heroin; who can do heroin recreationally? The profound realization was this: the first drink will lead me to my one true love (heroin) and, inevitably, death. I can't just change the substance I'm using; the thoughts and beliefs driving my deep-seated need to use in the first place are what need to change.

someone as "violently anti-religious" as myself, "We Agnostics" was hard to argue with. I had abandoned any idea of God. But other times, I would be absorbed in contemplation of the cosmos and aliens, usually high out of my mind, and I would wonder, "What is all of this, then?" This book is telling me I only had to grasp on to that feeling for recovery to be a possibility for me. I could do that. When I came to H.A., genuinely considered myself an honest person.

My 4th and 5th Steps showed me how insane that was, considering I had been blatantly lying to everyone around me for years. It was hard to deny any of my character defects after realizing the hypocrisy of my life. The light shining on my ego burned... badly. But by the

time I had made amends to those closest to me and to those I had been avoiding, the wounds healed into scars. The Steps merged my double life into one humble experience that could be used as my greatest asset.

Staying sober while practicing Steps 10, 11, and 12 are how I make amends to myself daily. I continue to use the tools in Steps 4-9 day to day, seek to improve my understanding of and relationship with God through prayer and meditation, and go out into the world as a changed human being to help whoever crosses my path. It's not rocket science.

Without a doubt, my main passion H&I, H.A. is bringing meetings to addicts confined to hospitals and institutions. Bill W. was the original H&I or die, begging Dr. Silkworth to share his story with patients at the hospital where he was treated. Nowadays, we don't have to beg, considering there are thousands of treatment correction centers full addicts, and we have committees established to help carry the message of Heroin Anonymous into as many of those facilities as possible. It's the privilege to be a part of this.

I've found a home in H.A. Here, I can share my love for the book Alcoholics Anonymous while also sharing my experience as a fiend. I'm dope uniquely qualified to help heroin addicts relate with a book published back in 1939, long before our epidemic was current even fathomable. Not only are hundreds of my fellows dropping into oblivion, hundreds of my fellows are dying every day.

Daily, I'm spared this fate, therefore my thoughts and actions are constantly directed towards sharing this gift with one more addict, God willing.

I've been able to experience so many things in unity with my fellows. I've been able to help out and be a part of amazing things I never could have imagined and I'd never change. I can't wait to see what I get to do in the years to come.
